I've been researching information on some prior year rendezvous photographs for Scrapbooker Carolyn Caporgno, and it has been a wonderful trip down Memory Lane. Our squadron has enjoyed some good times!

This will be the wierdest activities article since I began doing them in 2009. We cannot offer much! There's more "no news" than "yes news."

The July 10-12 Coronet Bay Crab Cookout at Deception Pass is iffy, depending on State Regulations and how we progress with the pandemic. Stay tuned. an email notification will be sent.

We have received notification of these cancellations: the June D16 Rendezvous in Poulsbo, the Sidney,B.C. Canada rendezvous, the rescheduled June Tulip Festival in Mount Vernon, and the July 18th Shipwreck Day. More than one-half of our planned yearly schedule vanished into thin air.

Our dock, which was damaged in April's big 3-day north windstorm, is scheduled for repair beginning in two weeks. It may be finished by the scheduled August 1 Lake Whatcom Rendezvous. If we go ahead with that, depending on State Guidelines, it would be limited in the number of people.

We have to stay tuned about the August 28-30 Bell Harbor Marina Rendezvous. Since Major League Baseball still is up in the air on its schedule, it may be a boating rendezvous with no ballgame or another cancelled event.

We've stayed busy with landscape projects and extended happy hours at the dock (the undamaged deck area) enjoying the view, wildlife, and variety of boating activity. Summer is on the way, but today (Memorial Day), it's raining, which is typical of our late May weather pattern. The stay-at-home program of Covid-19 has kept recreational boat traffic on Guemes Channel very quiet this Spring, but I saw a large increase in boat traffic on the Saturday before Memorial Day. I sure hope that the boaters were practicing proper social distancing. We saw one sailboat which didn't and which received a huge blast from the tanker overtaking it.

Crossing the border into Canada is still prohibited for recreational boaters, but San Juan and Island Counties are now in Stage 2, while Skagit and Watcom Counties remain in Stage 1 (as of Memorial Day). Roach Harbor Marina, <https://www.rocheharbor.com/covid-19/>, doesn't allow overnight mooring during State 2, but will open moorage at Stage 3, now estimated for mid-June. Check with your destinations before heading out. While some marine state parks are open for day use, it isn't clear if overnight mooring is permitted. Check with <https://parks.state.wa.us/1177/Novel-Coronavirus---COVID-19> for up-to-date information beyond the May 02 announcement.

Boat Handling Class – Online Success

The Educational Department finished the Boat Handling class by holding the last six sessions online with Zoom. The final exam was held on May 16 in the Anacortes Marina parking lot during a heavy rain. Ten students showed up on the damp day and are eagerly awaiting their results. USPS Headquarters is still closed, so I am waiting for an opening notification before I can send in the exams for scoring. The students and instructors generally felt that the online experience was satisfactory, although all would have welcomed the higher level of personal interaction found in the classroom environment.

District 16 Distance Learning and Meeting Initiative

The District Education Officer, Jim West, has been directed by the District Commander, Craig Brown, to investigate tools to facilitate online education, which also can be used to host virtual face-to-face meetings. The focus points and needs include: allow a squadron to distance-teach to its members and outside attendees; to allow squadrons who don't have a critical mass of attendees or time to teach a class to send their students virtually to the squadron holding the class; to provide a tool to hold small meetings within a squadron (like Skagit Bay does for the Executive Committee or as D16 does for the SEOs); and to host squadron-wide or district-wide meetings (as Skagit Bay did for the May 'Dinner' Meeting).

Ten interested members of D16 squadrons have been meeting online and by email for the past several weeks to discuss requirements, experiences, and to evaluate some common virtual meeting platforms. A couple of squadrons, notably Bellevue and Everett, have been using Free Conference Call to provide distance learning and D16 Squadron Education Officers have been use FCC for several months in a monthly evening meeting. Skagit Bay held successful class using Zoom and a couple other squadrons have also used the app for squadron meetings. The study group has held platform-specific meetings with Free Conference Call, Zoom, and Cisco Webex and plan on making a recommendation soon. At this time, the Pro version of Zoom, as used by Skagit Bay, is one of the contenders. Webex currently limits new accounts to paying businesses and the no-charge version is limited. Free Conference Call is fairly hard to use easily and is basically a voice-based system doing screen sharing. One person in the study group tested the new Google Meet product, but it lacks a couple of commonly-used features and requires all participants to have a Google account.

Stay tuned for more announcements on our virtual experiments.

Upcoming Classes

The Educational Department is in flux while we figure out how and where to hold classes. We are thinking about holding the Cruise Planning and Radar for Boaters classes starting in September. Both can be done easily with our online tools, but we really would like a classroom. We need to sort out locations, etc. More info will be coming during the Summer

.Safety Notes: Summer 2020

Browsing for Safety

Boating safety information comes at us from various directions and many different sources. Be it a legitimate safety issue of which all boaters should take notice or slick marketing of the next “must have safety gizmo”, we need to keep up with it. While many boaters intentionally subscribe to specific publications and websites to stay on top of such information, others might be more casual about staying informed. Allow me to suggest several sources all boaters might consider *bookmarking*. These sites can be trusted to alert boaters of developing safety issues, give guidance on rules and regulations, provide safe boating practices.

United States Power Squadrons: www.usps.org

Hopefully, this site is familiar to all of us. For those who have yet to visit the Safety Committee section of our website I hope you will take time to check it out. You will find latest information about developing safety issues as well as product recalls. It covers basic safety issues important to recreational boaters.

Official Website of the United States Coast Guard- Boating Safety Division.

www.uscgboating.org

This is a great site. It provides critical safety information to both recreational boaters and to boat manufacturers. For the recreational boater you will find information about accident reporting, boating education, safety checks, safety afloat. On the manufacturer portion of the site you might find information about possible defects and recalls related to your or a friend's boat.

Of particular interest here is Boating Safety Circulars. While mostly related to commercial operations and issues, some items are directly related to recreational boaters as well.

USCG Navigation Center www.navcen.uscg.gov

This is a big site with lots of information. It covers maritime safety data, navigation systems, safety information, reporting problems and much more. I hope you will take time to check it out as well. While you are there, sign up to automatically receive **USCG District 13 “Local Notice to Mariners”**. This weekly publication provides a host of safety information about our local and regional waters as well as more widely developing issues.

While these sites are familiar to many, I know others may be unaware of them. For those who not familiar with them I hope you will find some value in taking time to peruse each of them.

Alternative Moorage – Linear Moorage

At the Sucia Island rendezvous, there were only two boats Briongloid and ourselves. Briongloid arrived on Friday afternoon about an hour ahead of us. The Fossil Bay docks were absolutely full! All the mooring buoys in Fossil Bay were also taken. So they tied up to the linear moorage in Echo Bay. There was a spot for us when we arrived about an hour later. We have looked at that tie up before and for us if the line with the rings in it is too high, we can't moor there. But at this particular one in Echo Bay we were able to tie up. It was interesting. Saturday afternoon the wind came up at tide change and all the boats were rocking really well. But after about an hour or so, it calmed down. For the most part, it's just like being tied to a dock. You definitely want to use fenders even though there are Styrofoam floats on the line. They squeak something awful when rubbing on your hull. As you can see in the picture below, you tie up to the rings with a bow line and stern line. You cannot raft off while tied up here. There are two of these systems in Echo Bay and I know of one in Reid Harbor. Try it!
