There is always room on a boat for a book. As you venture to new ports this boating season and are safely moored or at the dock, you can relax with a good book and a glass of your favorite beverage.

Here are some boating-related suggestions you can stow aboard for your spring and summer reading:

On Island Time, A traveler's Atlas by Chandler O'Leary

Illustrated adventures on and around the islands of Washington and British Columbia.

Nightmare on the Scottie: The Maiden Voyage of a Doomed King Crabber by Stephen D. Orsini of Anacortes. WA.

An incompetent boat builder, an inept captain and engineer, and two college students come together for a thrilling and sometimes humorous tale.

Complete Yachtmaster, updated in 2021 by Tom Cunliffe

The standard reference for students as well as skippers of all levels of experience. It brings together all the essentials of modern cruising in one volume. He presents an analysis of a good skipper, the theory and practice of sailing and sail trim, the art of seamanship, accurate navigation including chart plotters and PCs, understanding meteorology, heavy weather preparation, understanding yacht stability and coping with emergencies.

Stress-Free Sailing—Single and Short-handed Techniques, 2nd Edition by Duncan Wells

step photographic instructions on how to perform essential sailing techniques, regardless of how much help you have on hand.

<u>Doctor on Board, Ship's Medicine Chest and Care on the Water</u> by William Forgey

It emphasizes head trauma and management of orthopedic injuries, seasickness and issues relating to cold injuries ("cockpit foot"), illness after exposure after leaving a port-of-call, and burns (including exposure to the sun and/or boiling water in the galley). All these and more are discussed with treatment options included.

Bold Sea Stories 2: True Boating Tales of Adventure and Survival by Marlin Bree.

A collection of 26 startling, harrowing and galvanizing real-life boating tales, complete with 60 photos, illustrations, and charts.

Adventures in Boating: Bad Decisions Make Good Stories by Charles Meier (2020)

A conglomeration of Stories that are unbelievable but true. Most if not all of the events probably could have been prevented with a pinch of Adult supervision. Not for people whom are offended easily. Laugh out loud humor.

Three Sheets to the Wind: The Nautical Origins of Everyday Expressions (2019) by Cynthia Barrett

An entertaining compilation revealing the maritime roots of common English expressions. Example: The original "slush fund" was the fatty scraps from boiled meat that the ship's cook secretly stashed away to sell at port to candle makers.

Go By Boat: Stories of a Maine Island Doctor (2021) by Dr. Chuck Radis

Fresh out of training, Dr. Chuck Radis moves with his wife and daughter to Peaks Island, Maine, to fulfill a Public Health scholarship obligation. Absent-minded and initially oblivious to island mores, Dr. Radis slowly adapts to a medical practice where x-rays and advanced laboratory testing are available only on the mainland. When he travels to the outer islands of Casco Bay for house calls, he relies on his physical examination skills and a tackle box of emergency medications to successfully manage his patients.
