We started in **Friday Harbor** where all that were to have gone were to meet up. But the others needed to meet other schedules so wend on ahead or behind us to catch up later. We are a slow boat so were planning 15 to 25 miles a day.



So now after waiting for Dodd Narrows its into **Nanaimo** we go. The Port Marina is huge and will try to shoehorn you in but prefer reservations. There are also a couple of other marinas that take transients in the channel. We spent a couple nights there waiting for the weather in Georgia Strait to calm a bit. That can be very nasty based on current and wind opposing. Great restaurants and provisioning near the dock. Its actually a large town.






Our next stop was **Sidney BC**. We love that marina and always go. Lots of stores to provision and a nice walk around town. We cleared customs by phone on way over as we have Nexus and did not even need to stop at the dock.



Next up was **Thetis Island Marina** in Telegraph Harbor via Sansum Narrows. There is a newer marina that the big boats stay in in the head of the bay but we have always liked this little marina with a cool pub and store on shore. .Its the locals hang out also as it's the only pub and liquor store on the island. We have been here a few times. It's a good half way point between Sidney and Nanaimo.



Across Georgia Strait we head. WG was active so we had to go north to Balenas Island then cut over to the south end of Texada. The water was choppy but no more than maybe 2ft and when we reached Texada shadow it went flat. Our destination was **Secret Cove**. A lot of folks like Pender Harbor but we though we would give this a try. It was very cute with a small store with café and showers. The folks were pleasant and helpful. Some interesting homes built with posts holding them off the cliff. How I wonder?



We left Secret Cove heading up Malaspina Strait toward Desolation Sound. We did make one overnight stop at **Beach Garden Resort Marina** which is in Powell River. It's a small marina with one long moorage and a laundry/shower area and a small fuel dock. There is a hotel and also a bus stop so you can get to town. The opening is right into the strait so you have to move fast to get thru but once inside its calm.

Leaving Tenedos we decided to head for Refuge Cove. It's a eclectic marina that is generally the first stop for boats heading into Desolation Sound and points north. Unfortunately they removed all the power form the docks but they do have a well stocked store and decent restaurant with a summertime bakery. There is no shore access beyond the property but we decided to spend 2 nights and just putt around.







The next day we rounded Sarah Point north of Lund which is the boundary for Desolation Sound Marine Park. We continued on to **Tenedos Bay**. This is a deep bay with lots of rocky shoreline and a good trail system to a warm lake inland. We spent 2 nights there practicing an anchor and shore stern tie arrangement.








Now onward to the most desolate and gorgeous destination of the entire trip. **Toba Wilderness Marina** in Toba Inlet. It is the only moorage available in the inlet and there is not anchorage for miles. We went up Homphey Channel after going around corner from Refuge and ran into the most rugged and wonderful scenery we have seen. The only thing we say was birds and some fish. Maybe 2 other boats until we dumped out into Toba inlet right across from the marina. There was some salmon fishing going on in that area.

Speaking of salmon fishing we were catching them off the marina dock in 150 ft. of water and one guy caught 15lb Chinook while we were there casting a chartreuse buzz bomb. We saw otter and eagles and seals. The weather was dreary but the scenery was wonderful and as we were ready to leave there was a bear on the beach at the top of the dock. If you ever go this is a must stop. They have generator power, great showers, free ice, a fire pit and covered patio and hiking trails. They also have a solid wifi connection to satellite internet. If you need emergency supplies they can make a run to Campbell River which they did at least once. I'm not sure the cost. But the couple that runs the place is always down on the dock helping out.









We left Toba Inlet (see chart clip) heading for someplace to provision. This was just over our 1/2 way point and we were going to go to Campbell River but the Toba hosts and others said why there? So instead at someones suggestion we headed for Gorge Harbor at Whaletown on Cortes Island. This was just barely outside Desolation Sound but was still a gorgeous run.

It was a great choice as it had a freshly stocked store with meats and veggies and lots of amenities as well as concerts on the beach on summer weekends. We stayed at the dock but the entire bay is great anchorage.

So now we started back south, After two nights at Gorge Harbor our next stop was to be **Lund**. This is a frequent stop for those going north for fuel etc and has a hotel and some good restaurants. Its clkaim to fame is also being the northern terminus of Highway 101, yes the same as ours. You can drive back to Vancouver from here (and beyond, but it takes at least 2 ferries.



We spent one night in Lund then headed south down Malaspina again. We did spend one night at Beach Garden again before continuing on to **Pender Harbor**.

Pender Harbor is a great stopover for a day or 2 while waiting to cross back over Georgia Strait. Its actually not a harbor in itself but a bunch of little marinas scattered in 3 or 4 fingers. Lots of restaurants and supplies in dinghy distance, We stayed at John Henry Marina. Nice store and lunch place with ice cream and music on the dock.





We had to wait a couple days as the strait looked nasty with forecast 2-4 ft chop and opposing wind. But soon we headed back to Nanaimo trying to leave early to get best weather. WG was open but even so the wind was 15-20 so we had to quarter across and drop down from Balenas. We turned south and cut in through Departure Bay and the channel and made it mid afternoon.

They Shoehorned us in behind a commercial boat as we promised to leave the next morning since we had to make the current in Dodd Narrows. We left at 9 AM and as we got past Protection Island and wind was worse than coming across the straits and all of us sailboats had our sails down and were quartering across the bay until we got in the lee of Gabriola so we could turn south toward Dodd, Once inside Dodd all was smooth and calm. Onward to next destination. We had planned to go to Pirates Cove for a night or 2 but since it was only a total of 10 miles from Nanaimo we decided to go back to Thetis Island since it was about half way and we enjoyed the marina. So we headed south and spent the night. You can see previous photos.

We left the next morning considering anchoring in Montegue Harbor and dingy to the cute pub on shore but again decided to go back to Sidney since it was not as far back to USA. So we headed for Sansum narrows and Swartz Bay.






